
BOB BOEHNER is a stamp collector and 10th-generation Canadian,

descended from Germans who settled in Luneburg, Nova Scotia, in the 1600s. His ancestors were subsistence farmers who raised sheep and cattle. Bob started collecting stamps at age 8, after a failed attempt at collecting coins. "I realized that I could use the coins on treats at the store. So that was the end of that hobby." When his aunt saw 15-cent packages of stamps at Woolworth's, "she bought two of them and gave them to my mom to put in my socks for Christmas morning. Those two stamp packets were from Spain and Italy. My granddad, who was a postmaster, would bring me stamps from discarded mail. ... That was more than 60 years ago."

Now Bob purchases stamps from the RSWR Stamp Ministry in Indianapolis for his collection. "The US issues between 75 and 80 per year, and some years as many as 200 commemorative stamps. I normally get as many as ten sets of most of the issues. ... I also trade, and occasionally I will sell one to buy another stamp."

As stamps journey through their life cycle, they are placed on letters as postage and then 'canceled' at the post office. The canceled stamp, which signifies that it has been used, is meant to prevent its reuse. Bob talked about the importance of having a 'clean cancel' on a stamp, given that sometimes stamps are obliterated by the cancel and thus are not tradable.

Finally, Bob reflects: "I've had a long and enjoyable connection with the stamps committee and the Quakers, and I hope to participate as long as I can. I hope that some of my contributions have helped people in other lands."



Stamping for Dollars Contributors

WILL REID lives in a Quaker retirement community where he collects stamp donations, which he then sorts and mails to RSWR. He says, "I started collecting stamps when I was in grade school and my family lived in Egypt. My first stamps were a series with the face of the King of Egypt on them." Then, when Egypt claimed to also rule Sudan, the same series came out with the added caption, "King of Egypt and Sudan." After a military coup took place, the same series came out but with black lines over the King's face to show he was no longer in power.

Will explains the stamp program as follows: "People send their stamps to RSWR, which then provides them to stamp dealers. The money from the sale goes to RSWR,

which delivers grants to small community groups in India, Kenya, and Sierra Leone. These groups then offer microloans to women who invest them to enhance their small businesses and pay back their loans, so the money can be loaned to others. The stamp program offers

opportunities to reflect on one's values, and to act on them efficiently in community with others."

BETSY CHESNEY speaks to her role in the stamp program: "I collect stamps that we come across and that I find among the archives in our house. Sometimes I will use an unusual stamp to mail a card to a friend, asking that friend to save the stamp for the

program. I also get other people to buy stamps for me when they travel abroad."

"This is not my favorite picture of myself, but I love the story that it holds, and it ties into the stamps. The gentleman with me is named Sebastian, and this photo was taken in his studio in Les Andelys, France. We were there to shop and look around, and I spied some stamped letters on his desk. I told him that we could use



stamps for a charity to help women in Kenya, India, and Sierra Leone. He walked over to a drawer, opened it, and took out not one, not two, but three envelopes of stamps, which he insisted that I bring back to the states to forward to the charity. In the photo, I am folding some origami to give him."
